# reactome.db: How to use the reactome.db package

## 1 Introduction

The reactome.db package contains mappings from Gene Ontology (GO) identifiers and Entrez Gene identifiers to Reactome identifiers of pathways. Reactome is an open-source, open access, manually curated and peer-reviewed pathway database. Pathway annotations are authored by expert biologists, in collaboration with Reactome editorial staff and cross-referenced to many bioinformatics databases. The core unit of the Reactome data model is the reaction. Entities (nucleic acids, proteins, complexes and small molecules) participating in reactions form a network of biological interactions and are grouped into pathways. Examples of biological pathways in Reactome include signaling, innate and acquired immune function, transcriptional regulation, translation, apoptosis and classical intermediary metabolism. The reactome.db package also contains a mapping from Reactome identifier to the name of the pathway. It can be used for gene set enrichment analysis or just to look up the biological context of a given gene.

## 2 Examples

### 2.1 Basic information

The *reactome.db* package provides an interface to an SQLite database, which contains a subset of the Reactome database. The command 1s can be used to get an overview of the methods that the package contains.

#### R> library("reactome.db")

The same basic set of objects is provided with the db packages:

### Exercise 1

Start an R session and use the library function to load the reactome.db software package.

It is possible to call the package name as a function to get some QC information about it.
